Fun Phrase of the Month

“RAINING CATS AND DOGS”

There are various suggestions for the origin of this phrase. One is that in the 17th century heavy rains in London made gutters overflow with various kinds of filth, including dead cats and dogs. Another is that cats and dogs were closely associated with Norse mythology—wolves (or dogs) were attendants of the storm god Odin, and cats were thought to cause storms. Perhaps the simplest explanation is that the noise and violence of a big storm sounded like a dog and cat fight. The first written example of the phrase in its modern form is in Jonathan Swift's *Polite Conversation*, published in 1738.

Predating that, Henry Vaughan's *Olaf Iscanus* (1651) included the line “Their wares from Dogs and Cats rain'd in showre.” A year later, the line “It shall raine...Dogs and Polecats” appeared in Richard Brome's *The City Witt*.

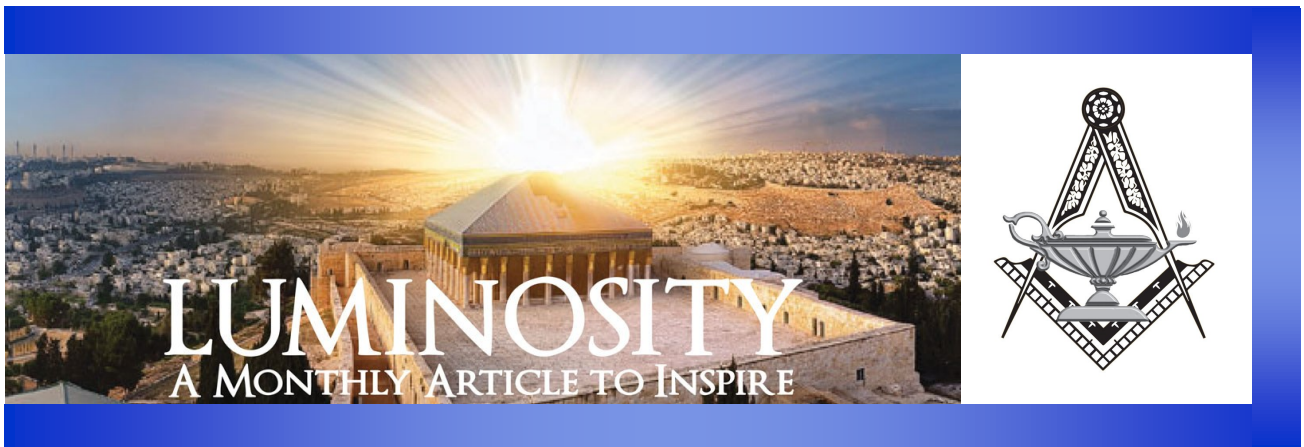

The Winding Path to Enlightenment

Let us explore what it means to persevere through the winding path and how introspection serves as a compass in our journey toward the light.

The Symbolism of the Winding Path

The idea of a winding path is a fitting metaphor for the Masonic journey. In our degrees, we are symbolically led through various stages, each requiring us to confront uncertainty and challenge. The winding nature of the path reminds us that progress is rarely linear. There will be setbacks, detours, and moments where the way forward is unclear. Introspection is the companion to perseverance, providing the clarity and insight needed to navigate the winding path. Freemasonry places great emphasis on the importance of self-reflection. It encourages us to look inward and to examine our thoughts, actions, and motivations. Through introspection, we gain awareness of our strengths and weaknesses. We learn to recognize the biases and fears that may cloud our judgment.

Most importantly, we develop the ability to align our actions with our principles. This alignment is the essence of enlightenment, for it brings us closer to living as the best versions of ourselves. The winding path tests not only our perseverance but also our willingness to confront uncomfortable truths about ourselves. It is through these moments of honest reflection that we find clarity. Introspection is not always easy, but it is essential. It serves as a compass, guiding us toward the light and ensuring that our progress is genuine and meaningful.

The Role of Brotherhood on the Path

As we walk this path, it is important to remember that we are not alone. Freemasonry is a Brotherhood, and one of its greatest strengths is the support it offers to its members. When the path feels especially challenging, we can lean on our Brethren for guidance, encouragement, and perspective. This support is not a sign of weakness but a recognition of the collective strength we share as Masons. Together, we create an environment where perseverance and introspection are nurtured, and where every Brother is encouraged to strive for enlightenment.
